

- · This unit also includes two common, high frequency words, 'read' and 'goes'.

Teaching Points

- Identify the phoneme and how it is represented.
- Break each word into syllables; i.e. sud/den/ly (each syllable must contain a vowel [in ly there is no vowel, there is still a vowel sound]).
- Discuss how some words have double consonants to keep the preceding vowel short.
- Sort the list words to the graphemes and brainstorm other words to add to each list.

Unit Focus

- This unit focuses on words that end with the graphemes 'f', 'If' or 'fe', and irregular plurals.
- This unit also includes two common, high frequency words, 'large' and 'does'.

Teaching Points

- Identify the phoneme and how it is represented. Brainstorm to list other words that end with 'f', 'If' or 'fe'.
- Discuss the plural words and any parts that may cause them difficulty. Identify the singular form of each word.

Rules

- To make some words ending with 'f', 'If', or 'fe' plural, the 'f' is changed to 'v' and 'es' is added.
- When a suffix beginning with a vowel is added to some words ending with 'f', 'If' or 'fe' the 'f' is changed to 'v' and the suffix is added.
- When adding a suffix beginning with a vowel to most words ending with 'e', the 'e' is dropped before the suffix.

Teaching Points

- Identify the silent letter in each word.
- Identify any other difficult parts of each word.
- Brainstorm to list other words with silent letters and sort them into groups.

Rules

- Double the consonant to keep the preceding vowel sound short.
- When adding a suffix beginning with a vowel to most words ending with 'e', the 'e' is dropped before the suffix.

- This unit focuses on choosing the graphemes 'air' or 'are' to represent a sound (phoneme).
- This unit also includes two common, high frequency words, 'Dublin' and 'Belfast'.

Teaching Points

- Identify the phoneme and how it is represented.
- Sort the list words according to the graphemes and brainstorm other words to add to each list.

Rules

- The 'y' at the end of base words changes to 'i' when a suffix is added.
- To make the plural of words ending with a 'y' after a consonant, change the 'y' to 'i' and add 'es'.
- When adding a suffix beginning with a vowel to most words ending with 'e', the 'e' is dropped before adding the suffix.

Dictation

- This unit also includes two common, high frequency words, 'world' and 'clean'.

Teaching Points

- Identify the phoneme and how it is represented. Discuss how it makes a short 'e' sound.
- Sort the list words according to the graphemes and brainsform other words to add to each list.

Rules

- The 'y' at the end of base words changes to 'i' when a suffix is added.
- The '**y**' is retained when adding '**ing**' to avoid '**ii**' being written (two exceptions are taxiing and skiing).

- This unit focuses on the suffixes 'er', 'est' and 'iest'.
- This unit also includes two common, high frequency words, 'learn' and 'America'.

Teaching Points

- Identify the base word for each list word.
- Discuss how the list words 'hotter' and 'thinner' have the final consonant doubled before adding the suffix to keep the preceding vowel sound short. Ask the children why they think the other list words do not need to have the same rule applied.
- Discuss the rules for comparative and superlative words and ask chilldren for other examples to add to a list.

Rules

- Double the consonant to keep the preceding vowel sound
- When adding a suffix beginning with a vowel to most words ending with 'e', the 'e' is dropped before adding the suffix.

- This unit also includes two common, high frequency words, 'millimetre' and 'centilitre'.

Teaching Points

- Identify the phoneme and how it is represented.
- Sort the list words according to the graphemes and brainstorm other words to add to each list.

Rules

- When adding a suffix beginning with a vowel to most words ending with 'e', the 'e' is dropped before adding the suffix. (Note: The 'e' is also dropped in truth and truthful.)
- The '**y**' at the end of base words changes to '**i**' when a suffix is added.
- When adding 'y' to a word ending in 'e', drop the 'e' before adding 'y'.

Dictation

Unit Focus

- This unit focuses on contractions and hyphenated words.

Teaching Points

- Identify that the apostrophe shows where a letter or letters have been left out.

- Capital letters are used for proper nouns; i.e. names of places and months of the year; e.g. Europe and January.
- Some compound nouns add 's' to the first word; others add 's' to the second word; e.g. chief-of-staff, chiefs-of staff; lay-by, lay-bys.

- The 'y' at the end of base words changes to 'i' when a suffix is added. (The 'y' is retained in busyness, as not to confuse with business).
- The 'y' is retained at the end of base words before adding 'ing' to avoid 'ii' being written. Two exceptions are taxiing and skiing.
